

SHARING OF EXPERIENCE



PUJA GHOSH – MANAGER SUH-VIVEKANANDA ABAS, CHANDERNAGORE

I vividly recall that winter evening of Dec 2020 at Chandernagore Railway Station where a group of people were huddled together, trying to keep themselves warm. The children were crying for food while the womenfolk were trying to make them sleep. I watched the scene for a few minutes and then realized that these people were hungry, without food may be for days. It was the peak of Covid 19 pandemic, when movements were restricted, face mask was compulsory, the poor especially the migrants found it tough to find jobs and earning.

Instinctively, I approached them and came to know that they were shelterless and had no food for the past two days. I dialed the Administrator of the Shelter for Urban Homeless, administered by Chandernagore

Municipal Corpn and supported by State Urban Development Agency, for providing shelter and food to these helpless people. He was kind to admit them, seven altogether. This experience motivated me to join the Shelter Home and help the Staff in regular survey of likely locations where the shelterless people may be found. We surveyed, especially at night, Bus Stands, Railway Station, Ferry Ghat, Markets, Mandirs. Once they became inmates of the SUH, we helped them in maintenance of basic health and hygiene, good manners and involvement in daily activities like gardening, cooking, making paper packets (thongas) etc. We further assisted them in being recipients of various Social Welfare Schemes of the Govt, like opening of Bank Account, widow/old age pension, Swastha Sathi card, Ration card, Lakhi Bhandar etc In addition, regular Health Checkup Camps were organized for good health of the inmates. All these activities not only kept me busy but also gave me a meaning and purpose in life. I enjoyed my responsibility and assignments. A few months later, this SUH in Chandernagore was allotted to Maya Foundation of Kolkata for day to day administration. It is indeed my privilege that the Management of Maya Foundation offered me the post and position of Manager of Chandernagore SUH and with their blessings I am continuing and hope to improve the services day by day for the benefit of the under privileged people. I am happy and grateful to Maya Foundation for trusting me with this unique opportunity.

RAJ KUMAR GURIA – PROGRAMME MANAGER – TI PROJECT

As the Program Manager of Maya Foundation, entrusted with the responsibility of implementing the Project, titled, Targeted Intervention (TI) for Long Distance Truckers (LDT, I, Raj Kumar Guria, have had the privilege of being part of this esteemed Organization for over a year. Since 2021, our team has been tirelessly working on a targeted intervention project in Dankuni area in Hooghly District, supported by the West Bengal State AIDS Prevention and Control Society (WBSAP&:CS) and the National AIDS Control Organization(NACO), Government of India. Our project focuses on conducting regular general health check-ups and community-based screening and testing at various Truck terminal areas and restrooms to identify HIV-reactive clients among truck drivers and



helpers. We also organize annual awareness and health camps on World AIDS Day (December 1^{st}) and other special occasions. I am grateful for the opportunity to work with Maya Foundation, under the guidance of our respected Project Director Dr. Minakshi Gangopadhyay and Secretary Dr. Pallab Gangopadhyay. Their unwavering support and leadership have enabled us to effectively reach out to the challenging population of long-distance truckers.

SOCIAL HEALTH IMPROVEMENT

❖ GENERAL HEALTH CHECKUP CAMP

A general health checkup for all is necessary to ensure good healthy society. This is why we conduct general health check-ups of our shelter beneficiaries once a month and provide regular medical treatment to local underprivileged people to keep them health conscious and if anyone is suffering from serious health problems. Government or municipal health facilities and we conduct a weekly health check-up for pregnant women in our shelters. So that she and her child are healthy. Also we conduct health camp at different places during Durga Puja.







AWARENESS CREATION

Awareness creation is an integral part of health checkup, as a result changes have been noticed in our shelter homes, some of the regular good habits over time like importance of hand wash, cutting of nails at regular intervals, taking care of clothes and keeping them folded by sundown and such other daily good habits.





❖ THALASSEMIA & AIDS

We celebrated World Thalassemia Day like every year by participating in a big awareness rally and blood donation camp organized by the Serum Thalassemia Prevention Federation. Our aim was to create

awareness among people about Thalassemia. This is not a contagious disease, it is a genetic disease. This concept is not clear to many people so they are afraid of Thalassemia disease. That is what we wanted to inform and make aware through this gathering and World AIDS Day is celebrated through awareness programs in each of our shelters, so that their concept is clear about this disease.

❖ COOKED MID-DAY MEAL

Cooked Mid-Day-Meals are being provided to 40 Govt Schools. Serving of Mid-day meal in schools was introduced by the West Bengal government to improve the nutritional status of young children. This has resulted in improved interest in regular schooling and significantly reduced dropout rates. Also many children are getting nutritious food.



We are serving 40 schools in Kolkata with timely nutritious food. We are always getting favorable comments from every school authority about the food quality. We are very proud that we have been



able to provide high quality mid-day meals to every school with punctuality and many girls have come forward and earned earning opportunities as a result of this project. Many housewives have

developed a self-identity. Also not only girls but men also got the opportunity to earn. We are happy authorities and school teachers are very happy with our service to the youth of our country.

MAA CANTEEN

The Maa Canteen project is running since 2021 and launched by West Bengal Government to provide one meal at just Rs.5/- to K.M.C. We provide cooked rice, dal, vegetable curry and a boiled egg to 11 different canteens in Kolkata as directed by the ward authorities. This is a wonderful project of West Bengal Govt. After launching this Ma Canteen, many under privileged and poor people are getting nutritious food for just 5 rupees. Our Maa Kitchen cooking center venue Baghbazar Multipurpose Girls' School, 65A, Baghbazar Street, Kolkata—700 003 as per the guidance of Sarva Shiksha Mission has been shifted to KMC school, Deshbandhu Park in November due to some problems. We served food to 2000 people in Dhanna Mancha organized at Red road on 3rd January.





❖ TARGETED INTERVENTION

Long Distance Truckers STD/HIV/AIDS Targeted Intervention Programme among Truckers was launched on 1st December, 2021 by Maya Foundation. Total target population is 10,000 trucker drivers & Helpers. Our field area is mainly Dankuni, Chanditila-1, Chanditola2, Singur, Sreerampur, Masatof Hooghly district, West Bengal. Truckers are coming from different states of India, like Bihar, Orissa, Punjab, Rajasthan, Andhra Pradesh, Tamilnadu, Hariyana, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, Chatrisgarh, Jammu & Kasmir, Nagaland etc. According to NACP-V guide line mainly long distance truckers i.e. the truckers who travel 800km. or more than that should be included in our target population. These long distance truckers are more vulnerable to HIV/AIDS as because they have to spend day after day on the highway. They have less chance to have sex with their regular partner or wife. As a result they do sex practice with CSW&FSW or even practice MSM activity between Driver & Khalashi. According to NACP-V guideline truckers act as agents by which HIV is moving from small high risk groups to general population. People who are away from homes and families for long periods of time often indulge in risky sexual behavior which makes them more vulnerable to HIV. We divide our work into several sessions to run the project smoothly and we awareness people through street plays and counseling. Our project's mission was to reduce new HIV infections among HRGs and ensure that 95% and more HRGs know their HIV status. To promote better sexual health among long distance truck drivers and workers at various truck terminals or halt points in Hooghly district area, create STI, HIV/AIDS prevention and awareness among people in our community. Our target was 10000. We organized Health Camps at Dankuni, Chanditola-1, Chanditola2, Singur, Sreerampur, Masat of Hooghly district, West Bengal. Those whose reports come positive, we bring them to the nearby health center and they are treated.







CHILDREN SOCIAL INTEGRATION AND EDUCATION

HOSTEL FOR GIRLS

Hostel facility unit for 100 girls from underprivileged families is being run by Maya Foundation at

Jadavpur Bijoygarh Shikha Niketan, Kolkata. Most of the young girls here come from different neighborhoods and from very disadvantaged sections of the society. Due to family problems or poverty they are not able to study and many young girls are trying to get married by their parents, those children come here to study. They were admitted

in Jadavpur Bijaygarh Shiksha Niketan For Girls School. There are separate teachers for primary section and class 8,9,10 children, who teach them very carefully every evening on time. There are all subject teachers for primary section children and arts group, science, English teachers for class 8,9,10 children. We also motivate them for extra curricular activities and have teachers for dance, song, craft. Children learn with them very happily and we make them participate in various competitions. One of our members Mr.Suryasish Gupta gave a tab for primary children to understand the digital world better. Children start their day with prayer and yoga. As children are away from home, we try to celebrate Holi, Diwali, Christmas festivals so that they get home environment and stay happy.







NABADISHA

Under NABADISHA Scheme, efforts are made in mainstreaming of poor children, especially those from Slum areas through evening coaching classes held in Ultadanga Police Station,

supported by Kolkata Police, Govt of West Bengal. This main streaming centre is open from Monday to Friday, 5.00 pm to 6.30 pm. During these five days children not only study but also learn to participate in quiz or drawing. We try to improve their behavior along with studies and encourage them to undertake additional activities towards building of self confidence. The children are coached to participate in various competitions. We also celebrate special days at the center so that children understand the importance of those days for instance,



Rabindranath Tagore's Birthday, Holi, Saraswati Puja etc. We have many well wishers who bring smiles on their faces by giving food or new clothes or study materials to children on their special days and Durga Puja festival.







WOMEN SOCIAL EMPOWERMENT

The term social empowerment of women means that they have equal control over all parts of society and are able to make important decisions in their lives and have equal opportunities. A nation can never achieve sustainable growth without empowering all sections of the society equally. We have always wanted to empower women apart from providing shelter, food so that they can be self-sufficient and self-confident.

CLOUD KITCHEN: 20 of our inmates were trained in a cloud kitchen from Swapnapuron Organization. This training was conducted for three months. Our aim was that through this training they can start their own business. At the end of this training everyone is given a certificate.



SUH-ASHRAY KULTI: We have trained the inmates of our shelter to make paper 'thongas' so that they can become a little economically independent by making paper 'thongas' and selling them in the market.

MAA KITCHEN: The Maa Canteen project is running since 2021 and many housewives have become self dependent after the West Bengal Government launched K.M.C to provide one meal at just Rs.5/-. We are very happy to empower them economically.



SOCIAL BONDING ENHANCEMENT

SUH-ASHRAY KULTI & ASHRAY ASANSOL

MAYA FOUNDATION is operating and maintaining two Shelters for Urban Homeless (SUH), one at Kulti and one at proper Asansol town under DAY-NULM with support from WB SUDA and administrative control of Asansol Municipal Corporation. Inmates are brought to these Shelters through regular day / night surveys. Once they are registered as inmates, they are provided with a clean and tidy environment, each one having his/her own steel-frame bed, beddings and of course four square meals a day. During the course of their stay in the Shelter, the inmates are taught and encouraged to undertake activities towards self-earning through making of paper packets (thongas), daily laborers in farm fields, gardening, security etc. A Medical Practitioner visits every month for physical health checkup and counseling on general health and hygiene including yoga exercises. The inmates are involved in keeping the Shelter clean and tidy and also in maintenance of a Kitchen Garden for vegetables. In the evening the inmates enjoy through indoor games (ludo, carrromboard, Chinese-checkers, cards), reading of News paper, watching TV or singing of bhajans and kirtan. Besides, Maya Foundation takes the initiative of ensuring that the inmates are equipped with entitlements of Aadhaar card, Voter card, Bank Account and other social benefits like SwasthaSathi, Widow/Old age pension, Lakhi Bhandar, Ration card etc The SUH is maintained and operated in such a way that the inmates feel it to be a 'home away

SUH-KALIGHAT, KOLKATA

Maya Foundation runs this SUH on the 4th floor of a building located in Kalighat, under the administrative control of Kolkata Municipal Corpn (KMC). There are 100 inmates in this SUH, with a good number of school going children. It is a top priority engagement for Maya Foundation in ensuring that such homeless children get admissions in schools in their respective classes, besides arrangements for coaching in major subjects, singing, dancing and extra-curriculum activities in the evening for all children. All the other



facilities, obligations, rules & regulations, provision of entitlements, social benefits, earning opportunities, entertainments etc are more or less similar to the practices prevalent in other SUHs run by Maya Foundation.





SUH-TARAKESWAR, HOOGHLY

This Shelter for Urban Homeless is being run by Maya Foundation since May 2023 under administrative control of Tarakeswar Municipality and support of WB SUDA. Although, like other SUHs, it has a capacity of fifty boarders, presently there are twenty-two inmates who are being taken care of by the committed and devoted staff of Maya Foundation. In the process of routine operation and maintenance, it is ensured that there is an environment of family-living, having cordial relationship with each other. All the other facilities, obligations, rules & regulations, provision of entitlements, social benefits, earning opportunities, entertainments etc are more or less similar to the practices prevalent in other SUHs run by Maya Foundation.







❖ SUH-SAINTHIA, BIRBHUM

In Sept 2023 the Shelter for Urban Homeless in Sainthia was handed over to Maya Foundation by Saithia Municipality for operation and maintenance. The SUH started with just ten inmates but by and by through our continuous day / night surveys in RLW Station area, common market place, bus stands and temples, people without shelter started coming to the SUH and making it

their home. Now, there are thirty inmates enjoying the hospitality of the staff of Maya foundation. The inmates cooperate with each other and share the responsibility of keeping the SUH campus and the residential area clean and tidy, even the toilets are always spick and span. The kitchen garden too is taken care by them such that home grown vegetables are available for day to day meals. They start the

day with a little free exercise followed by morning prayer and tea-biscuits. Lunch is at 1.30 pm while dinner is at 8.30 pm. In between the inmates are free to go about their earning activities like working as daily wage labourer, as security, as dish-washers in hotels, maid-servants etc In the evening some go out for evening walk, while some get busy in the kitchen garden. They also

spend time in playing indoor games like ludo, Chinese checker, cards, carom or watching TV and gossiping. The Manager and the Caregivers have ensured that as far as possible the inmates are not deprived from benefits of Govt Schemes and Entitlements like Aadhaar Card, Voter Card, Ration Card, Bank Account, Swasthya Sathi Card, old age / widow pension, Lakhi Bhandar and such other social benefits. It is also seen that there is regular Health Checkup Camps so that the inmates are physically fit and healthy. 'A home away from home' atmosphere and relationship is maintained at all cost for optimum output of the DAY-NULM Scheme. In this direction, the staff and inmates organize and



participate in different National and State festivals like Durga Puja, Diwali, Basanta Utsav, Republic Day, Independence Day and many other important celebrations. Maya Foundation is committed towards making Sainthia SUH a model Shelter Home.

❖ SUHF-TELENGABAGAN, KOLKATA

Govt of West Bengal through the Departments of Women and Child Development and Social Welfare, way back in April 2012 entrusted Maya Foundation with the task of operating and

maintaining a Shelter for Urban Homeless Female. This shelter is located on the third floor of the H.O. premises of Maya Foundation at Telengabagan, Kolkata. The Shelter started with four female inmates and by the end of the first year the number swelled up to twenty five. Now the average number of inmates is twenty five. The rules and regulations for operation and maintenance of this shelter, all records and documentations, style and steps of keeping

the Shelter clean and tidy and a homely atmosphere, even making available Social benefits and Entitlements are almost similar to the existing norms and practice followed in SUHs run by Maya Foundation under DAY-NULM.

❖ SUHM-RAJABAZAR, KOLKATA

Following the success of Shelter for Urban Homeless Female, Departments of Women and Child Development and Social Welfare, Govt of West Bengal, came forward with the proposal of operating and maintaining a Shelter for Urban Homeless Male, accordingly, May Foundation on 3rd August 2013 launched a SUH for men on the 2nd floor of a prominent building at Rajabazar, Kolkata. Within a short period the number of inmates increased from seven to eighteen and now it is forty plus. Majority of the shelterless men hail from suburbs and even rural Bengal (as far as Murshidabad to Canning) who come to Kolkata seeking for jobs. A few are from Sealdah Station area. All the inmates express in one voice their happiness and gratitude to live in a Shelter that is centrally located, clean and tidy, friendly and supportive staff, regular health checkup facility, minimum restrictions and above all secured and peaceful. The pattern and style of operation and maintenance of this SUH is similar to the SUH for Women. It is no doubt that the success of this SUH is another feather in the cap of Maya Foundation.





❖ SUH – VIVEKANANDA ABAS, CHANDERNAGORE

In July 2022 Chandernagore Municipal Corporation selected Maya Foundation to take over the responsibility of operation and maintenance of Shelter for Urban Homeless, known as Vivekananda Abas at Chandernagore. No doubt, the administration of Chandernagore Municipal Corpn (CMC) was well impressed with the experience, performance and good will of Maya Foundation. The result was visible. Within sixty days of taking over, the number of residents increased from twelve to thirty-two. The dedication and commitment of the Staff ensured frequent day / night surveys in likely places where the shelterless people may be found, their friendly and cordial relationship encouraged maintenance and continuity of a homely atmosphere which in turn helped in day-to-day community living just as it is found in other SUHs run by Maya Foundation. Here too, the Staff took the initiative of making available Entitlements

(Bank Account, Aadhaar card, Voter card) and Social benefits like Swasthya Sathi card, ration card, old age / widow pension, Lakhi bhandar etc. In addition, regular Health Checkup Camps promoted a good and healthy community. The inmates, by and by, felt a sense of belonging and a gradual change could be noticed in their thinking and attitude. It was in the right direction of the aim and objective of the Scheme, DAY-NULM.







❖ SUH-DISHARI, SANTIPUR

In May 2021, the Authority of Santipur Municipality informed that they were happy to entrust the operation and maintenance of a Shelter for Urban Homeless (SUH), named DISHARI to Maya Foundation. Accordingly, on 1st July, 2021Dishari was inaugurated with ten inmates and Maya

Foundation took over the charge of running the SUH as per guidelines of WB-SUDA and practice and tradition prevalent in other SUHs under Maya Foundation. The Staff devoted themselves in the task of making this SUH a 'Mandir' sacred and respected, to be visited often out of love and care. They visited from house to house and preached the message of sharing and caring for those less fortunate, deprived and forgotten in the society. Slowly but surely Social Activists, NGOs, prominent citizen of Santipur, student community, even children started to visit Dishari with gifts and offerings, professing in action their deep faith in the age old 'Baishnav' culture of Santipur. In the meantime Dishari became green through planting of trees and a vegetable



yielding kitchen garden. The inmates increased from ten to thirty, all residing as members of a big family, their basic needs being taken care of by the active Staff. Like the inmates in other SUHs under O & M of Maya Foundation, the inmates of Dishari too enjoy the facilities and benefits of Entitlements and Social Welfare Schemes of the Govt.

SUCCESS STORIES

❖ TARGETED INTERVENTION (TI)

A 25 year old long-distance truck driver from Vaishali, Chandpur, Raghopur, Bihar, was identified as HIV reactive during a health camp organized by Maya Foundation's TI-LDT Unit at Ultra Tech Cement Company on July 17, 2023. Following community-based testing, we persistently communicated with the client to undergo confirmatory tests at our ICTC Centre. After several follow-ups, he finally visited our centre on August18, 2023, and was confirmed HIV positive at Uttar Para S G Hospital's ICTC Department.

We immediately linked him to Chinsura Hospital's ART Centre for treatment. Unfortunately, he faced discrimination and termination from his job due to his HIV status. Our team intervened, educating the parking manager about HIV, dispelling stigma, and promoting inclusivity. Consequently, he was reinstated in his position.

Furthermore, we face-lifted the driver's spouse to access HIV Testing service at the District Hospital in Bihar, ensuring that she received the necessary screening and support. Fortunately, her test results revealed that she was HIV negative, a welcome outcome that brought relief and reassurance to the couple. Currently, the young man is adhering to his treatment regimen and leading a healthy life, thanks to his cooperation and our timely intervention and support.

This success story highlights Maya Foundation's dedication in identifying HIV cases, providing access to treatment, and combating discrimination, ensuring that individuals like this truck driver can reclaim their livelihood and live with honour and dignity.

NABADISHA MAINSTREAMING CENTRE

Avishek Rajak, a student of Nabadisha, is currently working at a Primary health centre in Bihar. Avishek comes from a very poor family and had a strong desire to study, but his parents couldn't afford it. However, Nabadisha supported him and enabled him to continue his education. In 2020, Avishek successfully passed his higher secondary examination after which pursued a career and secured a job at the health centre. Avishek's success is a testament to the dedication of Nabadisha to its students. His achievement is a beacon of hope for his family and a proud moment for Nabadisha.



GIRLS' HOSTEL

It is a Hostel unit for 100 girls from under privileged families located at Jadavpur Bijoygarh Shikha Niketan for Girls. The boarders in this Hostel were ecstatic when the Madhyamik examination results were announced. The teachers shared in their joy. Tripti Halder, a long-term resident of the institution, had achieved a remarkable feat by passing her Madhyamik exam. Despite her humble background, Tripti had always shown a keen interest in education. Due to financial constraints, her parents were unable to support her schooling, and she was admitted to Jadavpur Home at the tender age of 9 in 2017. With unwavering enthusiasm, she actively participated in various extra curricular activities, including dance, music, and sports, in addition to her academic pursuits. She was an integral part of all school functions, showcasing her versatility. However, her life



took an unexpected turn in 2023 when she was forced to marry at the age of 15 during her vacation. Although she reluctantly accepted her fate, she faced significant challenges in her new life. With remarkable courage, she reached out to the local administration, which came to her aid and facilitated her return to the residential home. Tripti resumed her studies with renewed determination and passed her Madhyamik exam with outstanding marks in 2024. Tripti Halder is now poised to forge her own path in life. We extend our heartfelt congratulations to her.

❖ SUHF-TELENGABAGAN

Mridula Roy, staff of SUHF-Teleangabagan, identified Mrs. Malti Majhi and her son while conducting a survey at Ultadanga Railway Station. Malti Majhi was with her son due to a family turmoil with her husband and so left the house and took shelter at the Station. Our staff talked to them and with their consent, Malati and her son, were brought to Telangabagan SUHF. Thereafter, Ms Nupur Das, a senior Staff of SUHF, took her son Rajdeep Majhi, (8 years old) and admitted him to Sudip Paul Government School. In another occasion during a routine survey at the Canal West slum area, Mridula Roy one of the survey staff found a poor woman with her daughter sitting in a trolley-van. During the conversation, the woman revealed that she works as a house-maid in different flats nearby and at night she and her daughter take shelter in a small area surrounded by plastic and waste



material. She was worried about her growing child as she remains all alone when she is at work. Mridula informs this poor and frustrated woman about the Shelter for Female at Telengabagan and convinces her to take advantage of this secured and peaceful SUHF at Telengabagan. Finally, the mother and daughter agree and accompany the Staff to SUHF. After a few days of stay, the little daughter, named Tumpa Nas (13 years) was admitted in Sudip Paul Govt School. Both Rajdeep Majhi and Tumpa Nas are now students to the delight of their respective mothers and support of the Staff of Maya Foundation.



❖ SHINING STAR

One of the shining Stars of Maya Foundation is Beauty Chatterjee, who for the past ten years has been serving the Organization with her examples of hard-work, integrity and a bright smile at all time. Credit goes to her for the successful implementation of Govt Schemes like Mid-day Meal, Maa Kitchen and other projects. Recently she was awarded by Krishna Trust for being an active Social Welfare Activist. She is a natural leader, capable of motivating fellow employees. ❖ INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Note 17: Significant Accounting Policies & Notes to the Accounts for the Year 2023-24

1. Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The financial statements have been prepared and presented in accordance with Indian Generally accepted Accounting principles (GAAP) under historical cost convention on accrual basis. Gasp comprises accounting standards notified by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI), and the other pronouncements of ICAI, especially the technical guide on accounting and auditing in not-for-profit organization to the extent applicable.

2. Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with GAAP required management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of contributions and expenses during the reporting period, reported balance of assets and liabilities, and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements. Actual revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

3. Fixed Assets & Depreciation

Fixed Assets are carried at cost of acquisition or construction less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any, except in case of land which is carried at cost. Cost comprises the purchase price and any cost attributable to bring the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

For assets purchase from projects funds, a project assets reserve fund is created for an equivalent amount of the asset purchased during the year.

Assets individually costing Rupees Five Thousand or less are charged off as expenditure in the year of purchase.

Depreciation on fixed assets is provided under written down value method based on the estimated useful life of the asset at the following rates:-

4. Grants & Donation Recognition

Specific Grants (Project Grants): Grants and donations of this name are recognized as income in the period in which the related expenses are incurred and all conditions attached with the grants or donations are complied with.

Contributions from donors for specific projects are disclosed as restricted funds in the schedules to the balance sheet as Grant Surplus Reserve. Unutilized balance amount is carried forward in the restricted fund for use in future periods,

Unrestricted Gants (Free Grants): The grants received without any specific condition attached to the donation are recognized as income in the period of receipt.

Grants or donation received in foreign currency are recorded at the amount credited in to the bank account at the prevalent exchange rate on the date of transaction.

Contributions received in kind are accounted in the books in the year of receipt based of the cost of materials received and the declaration made by the donor

5. Other Income

Interest Income for all investments in recognized using the time-proportion method.

6. Expenditure

Expenditure is recognized when it is probable that the consumption or loss of future economic benefits resulting in reduction in assets and/or an increase in liabilities has occurred and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure encompasses both, expenses that are in the course of ordinary activities of the Society as well as losses. Expenses that arise in the course of ordinary activities include monetary expenses such as programme implementation expenses, office administration/maintenance expenses, salaries and other employee benefits and non-monetary expenses such as depreciation, other programme expenses.

7. Investments:

Long-term investments are stated at cost and are suitably adjusted to recognize permanent diminution in value, if say, Current Investment are valued at cost or market value, whichever is lower.

8. Current Assets

Project receivable as disclosed in the schedules to the balance sheet represents those amounts which the Society has spent against approved and sanctioned projects but grants from donors have not been received in full for the reporting period.

9. Cash & Bank Balances

All Bank Accounts in the name of the Institute maintained at various locations have been duly reconciled.

10. Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits towards Leave Encashment are accounted on Cash Basis. For liability towards Gratuity, no fund has been created by the society. Payment is accounted on cash basis.

11. Provision & Contingencies

A provision is recognized when the Society has a present obligation in as a result of a past event, when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

A contingent liability is disclosed where there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

12. Taxation

The Society is exempt from Income tax under Section 12AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

Since the Society is exempt from income tax, no deferred tax (asset or liability) is required to be recognized in respect of timing differences.

13. Segment Reporting

The operations predominantly relate to providing charitable services and accordingly this is the only reportable segment. Therefore, the Society has only one segment of "Charitable Work" and one geographic segment "India"

- 14. Loans & Advances, Project Receivables/Payables are subject to confirmation from respective parties.
- 15. The entity has considered internal and external information up to date of the approval of financial statements in assessing the recoverability of receivables, cash and cash equivalent and investments.

Previous year's figures have been regrouped or rearranged wherever necessary.
